Q&A: Joan Hansen

Hanging With the Men of Mystery

Toan Hansen loves to read. She loves authors. And she's made a name for herself and the events that she founded -Men of Mystery and the Festival of Women Authors—from it. Last year MWA gave her its Raven Award for outstanding achievement in the mystery field outside of creative writing. She recently spoke with Eric Stone.

ES: How many people were at Men of Mystery last year?

JH: We had 65 authors the year before and that was too many. So this year we cut back to 50. There were 15 new guys. That way we could have 500 to 550 attendees with them. Even though it's big, it still has some feeling of intimacy.

Why only male authors?

I had been doing the women's festival for a few years and I

wanted to do something with men that wouldn't compete with my own other event. I saw a calendar called "Men of Mystery" with photos of hunky writers and asked if I could use the name. I've got a committee to help. but I still do most of the work myself. To know that I've created something original that everyone likes so much, is very gratifying.

We do have a couple of mystery writers at my women's event, but it's more general interest. Gayle Lynds will be at this year's event. But it's smaller, about 150 people.

What differences do you see between male and female mystery authors?



The men are more noir and hardboiled. some of them are pretty graphic. We don't have that so much with women writers. One of my new guys though, his thing is teddy bears. He was a negotiator with SWAT

teams, a tough position, but his character is a teddy bear collector, so you never know. But even the hardboiled ones, when you hear them at the event, they are fun and funny and you'd never know they wrote like that. Also, men aren't usually as descriptive. They don't paint as

many word pictures. They go more for plot than character. There are exceptions, like Michael Connelly.

The Festival of Women Authors focuses on "literary fiction." What's the difference?

The suspense within the writing. Also, in literary fiction the feelings and emotions are more important than the plot. This year at the Women's Festival we're having Susan Kandel. The mystery in her books is kind of incidental. They are mystery plots, but she writes in a literary manner. She could almost be a literary writer.

A lot of the women want to be labeled mystery writers because they think they'll sell better. The best selling women writers are the romance writers, who we don't have at the Women's Festival, but next to that it's mysteries.

You never know how people will categorize their books. I wanted Clive Cussler to come [to Men of Mystery] but he said he doesn't write mysteries, he writes adventure.

Who's on your wish list to speak at Men of Mystery?

I'm looking at Lee Child. I would love to have Carl Hiaasen, I think he'd be a riot. I almost had Dave Barry, but I'm afraid he might overshadow everybody. I want quality writers, great speakers, but who won't overpower everyone else. I want it to be an event of value to everybody and I want all the guys to sell a bunch of books. I wouldn't ask the Da Vinci Code guy [Dan Brown] to come, he probably wouldn't anyway and he'd overshadow the other authors.

Other's MOs:

Seven Ways to Anger Your Agent

1 Give your contracts to your son/daughter/ neighbor who's a lawyer "just for a quick glance."

Publishing, like every other industry, has it's own vocabulary and mores. Unless a lawyer is versed in publishing law, this "quick once over" isn't going to do much but cost you money. Case in point: a lawyer who charged for the advice that a clause be put in the contract that said "the author's name will go on the book."

2. Discuss the business side of things with anyone else involved before talking about it with your agent.

Case in point: I had an author write to a publisher canceling her book deal. She didn't write to me. She didn't know I'd already cashed the advance check and mailed her the contract and the advance. She got impatient. She made us both look like idiots.

3. Delegate your business discussions to your spouse or some other trusted person.

This just doesn't work, ever. You're the client. I talk with you. I'll talk to both of you together, I'll copy him/her on emails; you can decide everything the way you want, but you, the author, must always take part in the discussion.


