I'm writing this rap in Scrivener, a popular piece of writing software. This is far from an endorsement of the program, since I've tried it in the past and didn't like it, but I've been mired in the second act of my WIP so long that I thought a change of pace might be just the jolt I need.

The reason I mention this is that SoCalMWA is planning <u>a writing software</u> workshop on October 22 in Studio City. This will be a free event to explain the ins and outs of various types of available writing programs out there, including Scrivener, plus some programs for idea/story organization, like Dramatica.

Board member Paul D. Marks is organizing this workshop and hasn't finalized all the speakers, so we don't yet know the exact list of programs to be covered, but you can expect a good overview of what's out there, what these programs do, how to use the most popular of them, and you'll be able to ask questions of existing users.




D.J. Adamson has just launched the second book in the Lillian Dove series, SUPPOSE. Available on Amazon.




THE MADNESS OF MERCURY, **Connie di Marco's** first book in the new Zodiac Mystery series, will be released on June 8, 2016.





"I'll be teaching some writing classes and holding a few office hours for writers who need help with their manuscripts, but basically I'm being paid for letting people watch me put the finishing touches to my next book, 'DESERT VENGEANCE.' It never occurred to me that some people define writers writing as entertainment!"

Holly West's story, "Don't Fear the Ripper," has been nominated for a 2016 Anthony Award in the short story category. Set in late Victorian London, it features Caroline Farmer, a Whitechapel midwife who takes it upon herself to stop Jack the Ripper's killing spree. "Don't Fear the Ripper" first appeared in the PROTECTORS 2: HEROES anthology in 2015 and will be re-printed in Otto Penzler's BIG BOOK OF JACK THE RIPPER in Fall 2016.

Ellen Byron has been invited to be a panelist at the Louisiana Book Festival on October 29. BODY ON THE BAYOU, the second in her Cajun Country Mystery series, debuts September 13.

Jane Haseldine's BLOOD BLACKBIRD, the third book in the Julia Gooden series, about a crime reporter who has no choice but to team up with her con man father, who abandoned her as a little girl, so she can decipher whether a stranger vowing he's the brother she lost thirty years earlier in a child abduction case is who he claims to be, or if it's a trap to ensure the many sins of her father's past will be paid in full this time, was sold to Kensington Publishing in a two-book deal, making it a four-book series.

Covert CIG Weapons

One of the challenges of being a political assassin is you want to get away with murder--literally. Consider the case of John Wilkes Booth. He shot President Abraham Lincoln at the Ford Theatre in Washington D.C. on April 14th, 1865 and then bungled his escape. Booth broke a leg when he jumped from Lincoln's box down to the stage. (And took a bow!) Despite relying on a web of Southern sympathizers, Booth was quickly run to ground. Surrounded in a burning barn, he was shot dead by a Union Army Sergeant—despite orders to bring him in alive.

For his crime, Booth used a single-shot, .44 caliber, percussion-cap Derringer. It was 5.87 inches long and could easily fit in a pocket. It was one of a supposed pair. The actual gun resides today in a display at the Ford Theatre. It was exhaustively authenticated by the FBI in 1997, after a prison inmate claimed that expert thieves had stolen the original gun during the 1960s and substituted a fake. Now there's a story to match the attempted theft of Lincoln's corpse in 1876 by a Chicago gang.

The best assassinations are those where no one knows murder has been done, at least not right away. Instead of raw courage or stupidity, an assassin needs a plan and specialized equipment. While poisons have always been used as an effective tool of assassination, our modern era seems to prefer the idea of guns and bullets rather than more subtle means.

In fact, some of the high-tech covert weapons described by Ian Fleming from Q-Branch were real and were first used by the American OSS (Office of Strategic Services) and the British SOE (Special Operations Executive) during World War Two. Many a spy mission during the war involved quietly murdering a French, or Dutch or Norwegian collaborator, so they would no longer benefit the Nazi occupation.

Since a part of the CIA's mandate is getting rid of foreign government officials, even heads of state, they were obliged to create some of the most interesting covert weapons in the modern age. Of course, the KGB did the same. Although the James Bond movies take this concept to an absurd length, the deadly pen, lipstick or cane are a reality of spy work and are real-world objects which we will examine.

Event Wrap-Up: Adapting Novels Into Screen/Teleplays by Eric Beetner

A full house enjoyed lunch at the Tam O'Shanter on Sunday May 22 and then enjoyed a discussion on adapting novels and other works into screenplays. An expert panel consisting of authors and screenwriters Richard Lange (Angel Baby), Jordan Harper (Gotham, The Mentalist), Terrill Lee Lankford (Bosch) and Elissa Matsueda (Spare Parts), broke down the process of adaptation.

Matsueda shared her insight in adapting a non-fiction source for the screen, saying she felt it "worked the same muscles" as creating original stories.

Lange said he might not do it again when referring to adapting his own novel for the screen. He didn't like being penned in by the rigid structure of the script, which is the opposite of how he works on a novel.

Harper was excited about the prospect of writing for features after years of working in TV, so he was eager to begin adapting his debut novel (due out in January) for the big screen.

Lankford revealed that he is often more precious about keeping element from the Harry Bosch novels intact for the Amazon series than even original author Michael Connelly is. Connelly, he said, is much quicker to let go of story elements from the books.

Moderator Eric Beetner kept the discussion moving along and the panelists were not shy about the myriad frustrations and roadblocks to working within the Hollywood system, but the conversation was informative and entertaining, even if a little discouraging.

As a bonus, Beetner's young daughter introduced the panel and charmed everyone with her adorable delivery.

At its most stripped down, a gun would consist of a barrel to hold ammunition, a spring and a firing pin. Most spy weapons follow this architecture, with some clever variations on the theme. Obviously a commonplace item that resembles a gun barrel is the easiest to disguise. Specifically, the fountain pen gun, the lipstick gun, the cane gun and the briar pipe gun. All of these are meant for use in a paranoid environment where security is high.



Gun canes go back to roughly the Civil War. Sword canes have been around since the Renaissance.

One of the first covert guns was the ring gun. This complex little piece looked like a large, man's ring, but the back end held a miniature revolver, or really a "pepper pot" since there was no barrel per se, just a slightly lengthened cylinder holding six shots. The ring is normally aligned so that the "gun" part faces inward, concealed by the fingers and palm. The device in our photo appears to use .22 shorts as ammunition and the cylinder is rotated by manually turning the knurled ring at the top edge. The trigger

is the tab on the side of the ring. It's a clever and deadly gun which could be quite dangerous close-up. To use, twist around on the finger and press the tab to fire, then rotate the cylinder (careful, it's hot) and fire again.

Most covert guns are single shot and meant to be used at extreme, point-blank range. That's certainly true for the pipe gun and the lipstick gun. They would have very little accuracy so the best plan is to jam them up against someone's head and fire. It takes a very special, very dedicated personality to do that. The pen gun actually had a bit of a barrel and so might have had a range of a few feet.

As a young man, I had a chance to hold and examine a fountain pen gun. It was a WWII vintage item but today's versions operate in much the same way. The one I saw had a two inch-long barrel which unscrewed from the firing mechanism. It took a .25 caliber rimfire short, much like the one in the photo. A small steel ball in a "J" gate stuck out of the upper pen body and was attached to a firing pin rod inside. You pulled the ball back against a strong spring with your thumb and eased the ball down into the hook of the "J". Now it was cocked and ready to fire. At the appropriate moment, you took aim, slid the ball into the long slot of the "J" and released it. The firing pin sprang against the round in the barrel, shooting a bullet out the front of the pen. Mightier than the sword, indeed.

Most of these devices, despite their beautiful craftsmanship, were meant to be dropped or otherwise discarded once used—a shame but a necessity. Bowing afterwards is not recommended.

Next time we'll begin the history of police firearms at home and abroad.
