"Numbers have a way of taking a man by the hand and leading him [or her] down the path of reason." —Pythagoras 570–495 BC

Many years ago I discovered mathematical patterns hidden inside bestselling novels. THE BIG SLEEP by Raymond Chandler, GONE GIRL by Gillian Flynn, THE LINCOLN LAWYER by Michael Connelly, and KILL SHOT by Vince Flynn are all mysteries—from the P.I. genre to the thriller subgenres of suspense, legal, and political espionage. All four are brilliantly constructed, and their secrets can be revealed by metrics.

Look at the table of numbers starting from the left-hand side. The title and author of each book are listed, then the publication date, then the word count. The last two columns show numbers almost never calculated for novels: the number of characters appearing in the set-up of the story and the number of those same characters who make it all the way through to the climax and ending.

Although the word count varies widely—from 72k to 146k—there is a mere 11-character difference in the number of characters making it from the set-up (the first quarter) all the way through the story to the last-quarter. This is the core cast of each story, the people who have carried the plot on their shoulders all the way through.

Most writers never think of counting characters, but it's a good way to check how a core cast has fared over the course of a manuscript. Barring a hidden-identity surprise, the characters showing up at the end should be ones readers are familiar with and recognize readily. The more page time these characters have had, and the more ups and downs they've gone through, the more readers care about what happens to them as the climax unfurls toward an ending.

If the number of surviving characters in the last quarter is too high, readers may lack enough time with each one to get acquainted and develop a bond. (Please note the emphasis on "may." Metrics are not hard and fast rules, they are indicators that something could use a check-up.) A high last-quarter number may signify that characters have whipped through the second act without much development. This can be a common problem in first-draft manuscripts when writers excitedly create new character after new character instead of deeply developing those already introduced in previous chapters. Remember, the more bonded readers are to characters, the more invested and enthused they are likely to be as a story nears the climax.


What about a low number of characters surviving in the last quarter? A low number may signal a lack of interconnected relationships that flesh out the "world" of the novel. For example, the lowest number of surviving characters that I found

(outside of the mystery genre) belonged to INTERVIEW WITH A VAMPIRE by Anne Rice. Only four characters survived. Why? Because vampires outlive everyone around them. Writers can learn something from this metric: A low survival rate indicates a pall of loneliness and loss over the story. If a cozy manuscript-in-progress has a low survival rate, it may not be so cozy. The clue is right there in the metrics.

Somewhere, Pythagoras is smiling.
