HEAD WOUNDS, the fifth in the critically-acclaimed series of mysteries by **Dennis Palumbo** featuring Pittsburgh psychologist Daniel Rinaldi, comes out on February 5 from Poisoned Pen Press.

Ellery Queen Mystery Magazine has purchased **Craig Faustus Buck's** "Race to Judgment," a light-hearted noir tale about a Mississippi judge and gubernatorial candidate who fires a shotgun at two vandals who are dumping manure in his car, only to discover that he has killed his own brother. The pub date has not yet been announced.




OVER the TRANSOM

Thomas Perry's 25th novel, THE BOMB MAKER, will be published on January 4 (Mysterious Press).

The third book in **S.W. Lauden's** punk rock P.I. series, <u>HANG TIME</u>, will be released on January 16. HANG TIME brings together the colorful cast of characters from BAD CITIZEN CORPORATION and GRIZZLY SEASON in a thrilling and atmospheric series finale fueled by sex, drugs, backstabbing band mates, cheating spouses, and vicious cops. The non-stop action will keep readers dangling until the very end. *Kirkus Review* had this to say about HANG TIME: "Lauden's prose zooms along with an arch energy, and the final installment in his Greg Salem trilogy keeps the plot twists coming at warp speed." <u>Event information here</u>.

LAST STOP IN BROOKLYN, **Lawrence H. Levy's** third book in his Mary Handley mystery series, is being published by Random House/Broadway Books on January 9. It's the 1890's and while sleuthing murders, Mary once again finds herself involved in issues that very much resound today: xenophobia, suicide bombings, and anti-Arab sentiment. An early review by *Booklist* said "this series' third episode will win additional fans for the tough Irish American PI. Levy's talent for bringing history to life, both the everyday details and the roles of well-known figures—Teddy Roosevelt and Jacob Riis, for instance—shine in this well-plotted and fast-paced historical mystery."

At year's end, **John Morgan Wilson** celebrated the closing of an option deal with veteran New York producer Jean Doumanian (*August: Osage County*) for the film and TV rights to his eight-book Benjamin Justice series. Meanwhile, John's short story, "The Case of the Curious Collector," appears in the just-out special Sherlock Holmes issue of *Ellery Queen Mystery Magazine*, with publisher's copies going to the Sherlock Holmes Literary Society, AKA the Baker Street Irregulars.





I Venture Into the World of Little Free Libraries by Jeri Westerson



I had heard of Little Free Libraries on social media, little hut-like, mailbox-sized structures installed near the sidewalk on people's properties. The idea that you could put out a box with books with a "Take a Book, Return a Book" philosophy seemed so very democratic that I was intrigued. They were as simple as a carved-out tree stump, or as elaborate as a solar panel-lit doll house. I wanted in.


Now, I could have built it myself, but the days when I built birdhouses and carved gifts for friends and family were pretty much over. It was tough to turn around in our very cluttered garage and I had books to write. But I mentioned it enough that my husband, Craig, took note. Even as to the kind I was thinking of making: a Tudor-style cottage.


When my birthday rolled around last year, he was working on a secret project in the garage. I was not allowed in there. And I had no clue as to what he was doing. When it finally emerged, I knew instantly what it was.

He put the white base coat on and left it for me to do the artistic painting. I got to it right away. From the "thatched roof", to the aged plaster, to the half-timbers.

But this was way back in July. It's hot in the Inland Empire. Too hot to be outside digging a foundation and doing cement work. And then a book tour took away our weekends. It wasn't until late November that he was able to get out there and set it up.

He'd already gotten it registered with LittleFreeLibrary.org, and it was up to me to add the details to get it on the world map. Turns out there's another one in my town a few miles away.





promote "literacy, community, and creativity." If you can't build your own, you can buy a little library from them, even get books (though I got a lot of mine from my local library's Friends of the Library bookstore, especially the YA books that I simply don't have around. And yes, even copies of my own mysteries.) Now I'm called a "Steward" and though I try not to obsess over it, I am constantly creeping by my front window to spy on it. I want to be handy to answer questions, though when you register it and pay the fee, you receive a charter sign with your registration number, and the "Take a Book, Return a Book" slogan on it, which you mount on the library. They work with people

Since snow and snowplows don't seem to be in issue in SoCal, I felt confident that we could put it right next to the sidewalk, and since we have a corner lot on a path leading directly to an elementary school and near a school bus stop, I knew it should have an adequate supply of YA and children's books. PRIVATE EYE WRITERS OF AMERICA ACCEPTING SUBMISSIONS FOR 2018 SHAMUS AWARDS

Following are the categories for the Private Eye Writers of America 2018 Shamus Awards for private eye novels and short stories first published in the United States in 2017. The awards will be presented in the fall of 2018.

DEADLINE: Submissions must be postmarked by March 31, 2018. No extensions can be given.

Shamus Committees will forward their final list to the Shamus Awards Chair by May 31, 2018.

ELIGIBILITY: Eligible works must feature as a main character a person PAID for investigative work but NOT employed for that work by a unit of government. These include traditionally licensed private investigators; lawyers and reporters who do their own investigations; and others who function as hired private agents. These do NOT include law enforcement officers, other government employees or amateur, uncompensated sleuths.

Independently published books (Indies) may be submitted to the Best Original Paperback P.I. Novel category.

SUBMISSIONS; Please send one copy of each eligible work to ALL members of the appropriate committee. Do NOT submit a book to more than one committee.

There is no application fee and no submission form, as a simple cover letter will suffice. If you have any questions, please e-mail Gay Toltl Kinman at gaykinman@gaykinman.com BEFORE submitting.

BEST HARDCOVER P.I. NOVEL: A book-length work of fiction published in hardcover in 2017 that is NOT the author's first published P.I. novel.

BEST FIRST P.I. NOVEL: A book-length work of fiction, in hardcover or paperback, first published in 2017 that is the author's first published novel featuring a private investigator as a main character.

BEST ORIGINAL PAPERBACK P.I. NOVEL: A book-length work of fiction first published as a paperback original in 2017 that is NOT the author's first P.I. novel. Paperback reprints of previously published novels are NOT eligible.

BEST P.I. SHORT STORY: A work of fiction of 20,000 words or fewer. Stories first published in an earlier year and reprinted in a magazine, anthology or collection in 2017, are NOT eligible.

the bottom shelf. The upper shelf has mysteries for adult readers. Little Free Library emphasizes that it isn't up to the Steward to keep the library stocked—that's the community part—but to talk to neighbors to also be stewards and add their own books, always making sure the books are appropriate for a varied audience.

I had a brief scuffle with a local Mormon who must have thought it was an easy way for them to leave the Book of Mormon in it. They restocked almost as soon as I took them out. But once I put a sign in there stating that "positively NO religious books of any kind" were welcomed to proselytize, it finally stopped. Neighbors stuffed it to the gills with childrens' books anyway as neighbors soon took note on their walks or bike rides that it was here.

In these times where ignorance seems to be celebrated, I had hopes that my small effort might yield encouraging results. Only time will tell.
