

The President's Rap Sheet

A quote from the Canadian literary polymath Anne Carson: "I write to find out what I think about something."

It's heartening news that even the most accomplished writer might leap into a story or essay without having a firm grasp on where she intends to go. This is a step beyond choosing not to outline specific logical points or story elements—we'll save a discussion of plotting vs. pantsing for another time—Carson implies that she might not even know what her argument or theme is before her fingers hit the keyboard. She trusts that the act of writing is enough to lend ideas the beginnings of clarity. She looks at what she has captured, decides what's wheat and what's chaff, and picks the best path forward.

My eighth-grade teacher was right, darn him. Theme *is* a critical component of any literature worth reading. But while Mr. Eyman had us begin work by deciding on a unifying subject, Ms. Carson refutes that approach—of course, she isn't hampered by a fifty-three-minute class length—and encourages us to trust the fundamental idea to come forth as we write.

When planning a book, I'll noodle over what trouble my lead characters might get into and how the experience will change them. I think a lot about what happens, but not what the book's really about. That I discover, like a magic trick my subconscious has pulled on me, during the first full reading of the manuscript. My debut novel, PAST CRIMES, revealed itself as a story about forgiveness. Rewrites allowed me to color in the theme that was already waiting there. I worried that the trick wouldn't work again, but it has. And from what other writers have told me, that little miracle is not so unusual. Themes often don't appear until the draft is done, like a reflection in a puddle formed after a storm. Sometimes we need a whole book, a whole cast, a whole plot, to explain simple truths. Even to ourselves.

We may be in the dog days of summer, but there's plenty to keep our chapter off the couch. August 25 brings the San Diego Festival of Books, August 26 is our joint meeting with the Orange County chapter of Sisters in Crime with special guest T. Jefferson Parker (see page one for details), and Bouchercon is just around the corner and across the nation in St. Petersburg, Florida in early September. If you're making the trek, look for me in the bar. Umbrella drinks will be my theme for the trip.

I just read Glen's Prez Rap and now I'm re-thinking my life.

Finishing a draft has never been a problem for me, but revising that draft is a major stumbling block. To combat this, I've decided I'm going to plan and plot my new novel thoroughly prior to writing that first draft. So far I'm enjoying the work so I'll likely continue this in spite of Glen's great advice. That might change, of course. He's got a lot more experience than I do.

But isn't this one of the main reasons we join professional groups like MWA? To swap stories and advice about what works and doesn't work for us? It certainly is for me.

I hope to see many of you at Bouchercon in St. Petersburg, FL next month!

Lee Goldberg has signed a new, two-book deal with Amazon Publishing/Thomas & Mercer, which kicks off with LOST HILLS, the first in a new series featuring Eve Ronin, the youngest female homicide detective in the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department, to be released in fall 2019. This is the second series Goldberg has sold to T & M, following his #1 Amazon Charts and *Washington Post* bestseller TRUE FICTION, which launched in April 2018, and the sequel, KILLER THRILLER, which will be released in February 2019.



Craig Faustus Buck has a drabble (a short story of exactly 100 words) in DRABBLEDARK: AN ANTHOLOGY OF DARK DRABBLES, published in July and available on Amazon. It is an expansion of his 50-word short story "The Hatbox," that first appeared in the micro-fiction lit mag *Blink-Ink* #23 in April, 2016. Also, Craig's short story, "Pongo's Lucky Day," will be published in Noircon's journal *Retreat from Oblivion* on August 6.

Maria Alexander's Arctic YA thriller, SNOWBOUND, will be released by Ghede Press on September 8. This is the highly anticipated sequel to SNOWED, which won the 2016 Bram Stoker Award® for Superior Achievement in a Young Adult Novel and was a 2017 Anthony Award nominee in the Best Children's/YA Novel category. Ghede Press will be releasing a Revised Edition of SNOWED on August 1. SNOWED and SNOWBOUND are Books 1 and 2 of the Bloodline of Yule Trilogy. Book 3 is slated for release mid 2020.

Clea's lover James leads the multifaceted team on a quest that takes them through lands both Magic and Mundane. But their greatest enemy? Time itself.

Connie di Marco's third book in the Zodiac Mysteries, TAIL OF THE DRAGON, will be out on August 8. San Francisco astrologer Julia Bonatti never thought murder would be part of her practice but when her former boss and current client asks for help she agrees to go undercover at his law firm. Three people have received death threats and the only common denominator between them is a case long settled—the infamous Bank of San Francisco fire. Before she can unmask the killer, two people are dead and her own life is in danger.



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
