


James Scott Bell's fourth Mike Romeo thriller, ROMEO'S FIGHT, releases January 7.







TIPS ON ESTABLISHING THE 7 ELEMENTS OF A STORY by DJ Adamson

SETTING: It's important that your setting matches the atmosphere of your story. Don't make it heaven if the atmosphere is hellish. Take the readers somewhere they would enjoy going, and you are familiar with. Or take them somewhere really exotic to grab and keep their interest. This might mean more research for you, but it can be a market aspect for the book. Example: MURDER IN BUDAPEST, or in the Lillian Dove Series, because of my familiarity with the state and its citizens, and no one ever goes here, I chose Iowa.

CHARACTERS: The protagonist is your hero or main character. The antagonist is what motivates the protagonist's movements or needs. These two characters you have to know as intimately as your BFF. Do deep interviews with both. Know what they want and need and what stops them from getting it. It is also good to do interviews with other characters as well. The better you know the character, even if a minor one, the greater chance your reader will have to relate to their action or dialog. If you need questions to interview a character, just email me. I am happy to send you some I use.

POINT OF VIEW: Omniscient—think of yourself as God. Detached observer—narrator telling what happened. First person—can be the hardest point of view to write well. A single character is telling the story, "I."

THEMES: Generally, a good story has three or more (depending on the length). A theme is the major idea the author wants to get across with the book. Minor themes then work to project the major. Example: SLAUGHTER-HOUSE-FIVE, even though it is a book about WWII, it is an anti-war-themed book. The minor themes which give the reader an anti-war opinion are: absurdities of war; freewill-determinism; death; meaninglessness of life; Darwinism vs. Christianity; authority to blame. Okay an easier one. The film and movie WIZARD OF OZ. The major theme is that happiness is where you find it. Minor themes: childhood; self-sufficiency; virtue; friendship; good vs. evil; family; value of a journey.

PLOT: Conflict—the dispute or struggle the story engages in exploring. Inner conflict: Emotional or psychological. In WIZARD OF OZ, Dorothy needs to find a way to be happy. Outer conflict: Physical events. In WIZARD OF OZ, Dorothy needs to complete the journey, destroy the witch. Climax: The peak or apex of the conflict.

DENOUEMENT: This is the resolution or conclusion of the story. For Dorothy, the climax was in defeating the witch and getting to go to the Wizard. Then, in conclusion, she finds the Wizard is of no help and she could have had what she wanted at any time—click those red slippers! In a mystery, the climax is generally finding the solution to the mystery. The denouement is the happy detective after having had such a success.

PRIVATE EYE WRITERS OF AMERICA SUBMISSIONS FOR 2019 SHAMUS AWARDS For Works First Published in the U.S. in 2018

Following are the categories for the Private Eye Writers of America 2019 Shamus Awards for private eye novels and short stories *first published in the United States in 2018*. The awards will be presented in the fall of 2019.

DEADLINE: Submissions must be postmarked by **March 31, 2019**. No extensions can be given. Shamus Committees will forward their final lists to the Shamus Awards Chair by May 31, 2019.

ELIGIBILITY: Eligible works must feature as a main character a person PAID for investigative work but NOT employed for that work by a unit of government. These include traditionally licensed private investigators; lawyers and reporters who do their own investigations; and others who function as hired private agents. These do NOT include law enforcement officers, other government employees or amateur, uncompensated sleuths. Independently published books (Indies) may be submitted to the Best Original Paperback P.I. Novel category.

SUBMISSIONS; Please send one copy of each eligible work to ALL members of the appropriate committee. Do NOT submit a book to more than one committee. There is no application fee and no submission form, as a simple cover letter will suffice. If you have any questions, please e-mail **Gay Toltl Kinman** at gaykinman.com BEFORE submitting.

BEST HARDCOVER P.I. NOVEL: A book-length work of fiction published in hardcover in 2018 that is NOT the author's first published P.I. novel.

BEST FIRST P.I. NOVEL: A book-length work of fiction, in hardcover or paperback, first published in 2018 that is the author's first published novel featuring a private investigator as a main character.

BEST ORIGINAL PAPERBACK P.I. NOVEL: A book-length work of fiction first published as a paperback original in 2018 that is NOT the author's first P.I. novel. Paperback reprints of previously published novels are NOT eligible.

BEST P.I. SHORT STORY: A work of fiction of 20,000 words or fewer. Stories first published in an earlier year and reprinted in a magazine, anthology or collection in 2018, are NOT eligible.
