On Ending a Series By **Jeri Westerson**

I have two long-ish series. One ended and another will be coming to an end soon. It's tough to say good-bye to your characters, to not live in that world with them anymore. But a series is an ever-changing challenge in today's industry with a crowd of both good and bad self-published books competing for your reader dollars.

The series that ended was my Skyler Foxe LGBT mystery series. I was taking a chance with this story I wanted to tell. Let's face it, LBGT books are small potatoes in the industry, and getting smaller. I found a LGBT publisher without my agent and wrote six books and self-published three novellas in the series. For what it was, it offered me only decent royalties, while the audiobooks were almost more popular.

After the sixth book, I intended to write more, but looking at the work output to financial ratio, it seemed like the natural place to end it. I have no plans to write more LGBT genre books, but I continue to have LGBT characters in my series, both medieval and paranormal, because that's real life.

I always planned an end point for my Crispin Guest Medieval Noir series. But I've cut the number of books I intended to write from 19 to 15. It used to be the expectation more books and a backlist drove sales higher. It simply isn't the case anymore. I know there are readers and writers with plenty of examples that prove the opposite, but many of those series began more than twenty years ago when there might have been more backing by their publishers, where there were many more bookstores than there are today, when the competition for a reader's time and dollars was far less than it is now.


I discussed this with my agent, in fact. They didn't want me to write more than *three* books in any new series. It was hard to imagine devoting that much time and effort on only three books. There's a lot of emotional investment in these characters. Though, it doesn't mean if the books have some kind of modest success that you can't write spin-offs or another trilogy, but it was tough to wrap my mind around it.

Midlist authors like me find it impossible to make a living, even with 26 books in print. I'll be very sad when I finally end the Crispin series. It's been going on for eleven years and I've been with him through thick and thin. I always knew how his story will end. Yes, it will be sad but also somewhat of a relief. For all the effort I expend researching and writing a historical, it doesn't offer enough renumeration for what I put into it. So I'm moving on to a different genre.

I've been writing a paranormal series. I'm really enjoying the freedom of writing them, getting back to a genre I enjoyed reading in my college days. My first published paranormal series was a planned six books, but again my agent suggested three. I pared it down to four. But in this case, I got ideas for two spin-off series of three books each. So as adamant as I was that I "simply couldn't write more from this series when it was *done*"...well, let's say crow isn't too bad barbecued. Writing these books gives me good practice for changing the way I work, and that's been the most enlightening of this experience.



Jeri Westerson is the author of the Crispin Guest Medieval Mysteries, a series nominated for 13 national awards from the Agatha to the Shamus. Of her debut paranormal fantasy series, BOOKE OF THE HIDDEN, *Romantic Times* said, "BOOKE OF THE HIDDEN is paranormal romance perfection...Jeri Westerson is flawless in this tale of adventure, mystery and saucy romance." The next in the series, DEADLY RISING, releases October 23. Jeri is twice former president of SoCalMWA and OC Sisters in Crime, and former vice president of Sisters in Crime Los Angeles.
