Misery may love company, but happiness grows exponentially when shared. So here are my final executive orders as SoCal President: Be good to yourself. Be excellent to each other. And write on, dudes.

Thomas Perry's latest novel, A SMALL TOWN, will be published on December 17 by Mysterious Press/Grove Atlantic.






