



## Ten Tips for Writing with a Partner

When my husband I decided to write a 1950s hard-boiled mystery series together, we took a business approach to our projects and set rules of professionalism, respect, and patience. Partnering, well done, is like a ping pong game. Bouncing ideas off of each other helps push through difficult situations in the project/book. The results? A series of five novels and yes...we are still married.

Here are 10 things that work for us:

- 1. Character voice styles—Combining different styles when writing makes for more interesting character dialogue and personality. Value the style each partner brings to the table.
- 2. Deadlines—Set deadlines and stick to them. Deadlines should include: chapters, plot, character development, public relations. Anything pertaining to the health and welfare of the manscript should have a deadline.
- 3. Editing—The most important goal is to write a good novel. It doesn't matter who wrote what scene. If it doesn't work, don't use it. Both of us have had to give up scenes we bled over to write. If it slows the story down it has to go.
- 4. Meetings—Set regular meetings to discuss deadlines and where the book should be at each point. Be sure to have a beginning and an end time for all meetings. We found editing meetings should last no more than two hours at a time, all other meetings 30–45 minutes.
- 5. Organization–Each meeting needs to have a goal. Agendas are a must to keep the discussions on track. Be sure to keep copies of all meeting agendas and decisions made for future reference.
- 6. Support—Nothing beats having someone for "feel good" needs. But someone will also be needed to pick up the slack when things come to a screeching halt, i.e. when illness or writer's block hits.
- 7. Sense of humor—Laughter decreases anxiety. Remember, we write because we like to write.
- 8. Research buddy—Splitting the research work up and deciding what fits in the story works better with two brains and four eyes.
- 9. Goals—Goals function like a road map. You can't get anywhere in a timely fashion without directions. Set several objectives per goal that lead to your main goal.
- 10. Work habits—It helps to have someone to prod you along when needed. Different work habits and approaches can be complementary. Set specific time in your day to write and follow through each day. We find writing from 6 8 a.m. works well for us. It is before our day begins and life hasn't started.

# PRIVATE EYE WRITERS OF AMERICA ACCEPTING SUBMISSIONS FOR 2020 SHAMUS AWARDS

#### For Works First Published in the U.S. in 2019

Following are the categories for the Private Eye Writers of America 2020 Shamus Awards for private eye novels and short stories first published in the United States in 2019. The awards will be presented in the fall of 2020.

DEADLINE: Submissions must be postmarked by March 31, 2020. No extensions can be given.

ELIGIBILITY: Eligible works must feature as a main character a person PAID for investigative work but NOT employed for that work by a unit of government. These include traditionally licensed private investigators; lawyers and reporters who do their own investigations; and others who function as hired private agents. These do NOT include law enforcement officers, other government employees, or amateur, uncompensated sleuths. Independently published books (Indies) may be submitted to the Best Original Paperback P.I. Novel category.

SUBMISSIONS; Please send one copy of each eligible work to ALL members of the appropriate committee. Do NOT submit a book to more than one committee. If you have any questions, please e-mail **Gay Toltl Kinman**.
