
Mark Bruce placed another Minerva James story with *Black Cat Mystery Magazine*, "Minerva James and the Hounds of Hades." It will be published this year.




In the year that marks the 40th anniversary of the publication of FLOWERS IN THE ATTIC by V.C. Andrews, Gallery Books has signed a four-book deal for the next four novels, all ghostwritten by **Andrew Neiderman**. The deal is brokered by Alec Shane of Writers House and extends publications well into 2022. The first title, OUT OF THE RAIN, is the story of a five-year-old girl deserted at a rural railroad station by her recently widowed father. Additionally, Lifetime Networks has begun production of the next five V.C. Andrews novels in the Landry series. "Ruby," three sequels, and the prequel will air this year. "Ruby" is about identical twin girls brought up separately in the Cajun and Creole worlds of Louisiana and marks the 15th straight adaptation of a V.C. Andrews novel for Lifetime. More television adaptation rights are in discussion.




Martin Roy Hill's third Peter Brandt mystery thriller, THE FOURTH RISING, will be released by 32-32 North on May 10. The horrific murder of an old flame's husband sets former war correspondent Peter Brandt on the hunt for hidden Nazi treasure. The search takes him down a bloody trail leading from the drug cartels of Mexico to a neo-Nazi training camp in the Southern California mountains, and unearths a decades-long conspiracy to create a new Fourth Reich and continue the Nazi Party's plan for world domination.




