


# PRESIDENT'S RAP SHEET

# **Bring Your A-Game**

Some of you might know that I'm the editor for this year's Bouchercon anthology. It was an unexpected honor and one that I'm deeply grateful for.

The finalists have been chosen and we'll be announcing the Table of Contents soon. But today, I'd like to talk about a few things I learned while reading through nearly two hundred blind submissions.

First, choose your judges wisely. In my case, I asked a diverse team of book lovers I've known for awhile whose opinions I knew I could trust even if they differed from mine. I couldn't have completed this project without them.



Second, bring your A-game. Because if you don't, I guarantee there are plenty of writers who did and your story will get lost in the shuffle. As a short story writer myself, I always strive to submit the best work I can, but I was so impressed by some of the stories I read for the anthology that I had to wonder if I was capable of writing one that was good enough to be considered. As an editor, this was humbling, but also, a fantastic thing.

Third, a well-written story isn't always enough. The stories that stood out the most had some kind of hook that made them memorable. Something that made me keep going back, even with so many other great contenders.

So far, editing the Bouchercon anthology has been a lovely experience. I can't wait for everyone to read it.



Andrew Neiderman's THE WOMAN BEYOND THE ATTIC is a finalist for an Edgar Award in the Best Critical/Biographical category.




**Jennifer J. Chow's** DEATH BY BUBBLE TEA is nominated for the Agatha Award for Best Contemporary Novel.

# **WRITING TIPS & TRICKS**

# **Pitching a Grand Slam**

Nowadays, few authors, unless they are well-established, sell anything to film or television producers on a personal pitch. Inperson contact is difficult because of the pandemic and cutbacks in the industry. Most people "in the game" depend on agents to attract a publisher or producer to their novels.

However, a writer who has the opportunity to approach a producer [or agent] must develop a new skill, for the pitch is a special kind of writing which, in Hollywood especially, translates into an oral skill that is limited by the recipient's attention span or the "slot" allotted for you to be heard.

# Where can you get the most bang for your buck—or, in this case—minute?

No one will have as much passion for your story as you will. Agents are usually effective, but they are still an intermediary. Good agents have many clients and know what they're doing—they don't want to waste their time and effort. They have to know how to shop your work, which means having an awareness of what's the flavor of the month and which publisher or studio would want it.

If you go for a personal pitch, you must likewise study the market. Even then, you'll be surprised at what you hear. I have had successful novels about vampires, but instantly at the movie pitch, the producer or studio might say, "We already have our vampire movie."

So how do you do this?

Look at your story. Is there something about it that makes it bigger than horror, mystery, romance, or another genre? This is what your pitch should convey. Where can you get the most bang for your buck—or, in this case—minute?

I sold "The Devil's Advocate" to a producer involved with Warner Bros. I sold it on this line: "This is a novel about a law firm in New York that defends only guilty people and never loses." Two essential parts were "law firm" and "New York." They instantly describe potential characters and location. The last part was unusual: "only guilty people and never loses."

The obvious questions I established in the producer's mind were how and why? That instantly led to an intriguing answer: It's a law firm run by Satan.

Novelists dreaming of a film or series deal must craft a description that succinctly tells the story's who, when, and where. Contemporary settings are less expensive to make, but don't let that be the driver. Just be aware that producers have to worry about budgets as well as story. Most important, consider the elements in your story that will get someone to want to know more: What happens and why? If you can suggest the possibility of a sequel as well, you have hit a grand slam. It's just a matter of offering a few good thoughts about where or how your story could be continued and why the main character should continue.

Remember: you probably only have five minutes to summarize your novel and make it attractive. Producers want star vehicles and low cost. How would you have sold GONE WITH THE WIND in five minutes? Answer that and you might have a pitch for your own novel.
