Progress, Not Perfection



In 2020 and 2021, I did NaNoWriMo and completed 50k words during November each year. Do you know what I didn't (and still haven't) completed? An actual novel. I think NaNoWriMo is a wonderful thing, but this year, I decided it didn't fit into my writing plans.

Over the last several weeks, I've been writing and revising a novel that has been plaguing me for years. I'm determined to finish it. However, this week, I found myself stalled because I was unsure of how many procedural details to include after the body is discovered. I know I'm not the only writer to get hung up—for me it was procedure, but for you, it could be something else—and it probably happens with every novel. Whatever it is, we all have to get past these road bumps and move forward.



Yesterday, I texted my writing group and expressed my frustration with my lack of progress this week. They all commiserated with me, of course, but I went to bed wondering if I was destined to write and rewrite this damned book forever. But this morning, as I was driving home from the gym, it suddenly occurred to me: This is not a final draft. Who cares how much procedure I include at this point? Add what feels right, then change it, if necessary, later.

I felt a tremendous sense of relief knowing that I can literally write whatever I want, even if it all gets cut later. And, of course, I know this intellectually, but sometimes, I need to remind myself that I'm the one who gets to decide. Hence, the title. Progress, not perfection.




OVER THE TRANSOM

Jeri Westerson's new Sherlockian series, THE ISOLATED SEANCE, An Irregular Detective Mystery, features Tim Badger, one of Sherlock Holmes' Baker Street Irregulars now a grown man and opening his own consulting detective agency with Black partner Benjamin Watson. It's an adventure with wit and humor on the shadowed streets of 1895 London that Jeri sold to Sara Porter at Severn House for an unagented nice two-book deal for publication June 2023 and 2024.




