




OVER THE TRANSOM



William Burton McCormick's historical thriller A STRANGER FROM THE STORM (Mannison Press) won a Bronze Medal in The Coffee Pot Book Club's Book of the Year awards. Additionally, three publications featuring series sleuth character Santa Ezeriņa have recently been published: HOUSE OF TIGERS (Wildside Press), "The Celta Wave Conundrum" in the Sept/Oct issue of Ellery Queen's Mystery Magazine and "The Crimson Vial," in CROOKED V. 2.



Barbara Pronin's seventh mystery, THE MINER'S CANARY, will be published October. 25. The story takes a single mom from Southern California back to the brooding Black Hills of South Dakota, where she thought she had left her troubled youth behind. But inheriting the old Victorian of the aunt who raised her is more a test of her wits than a blessing.



Leslie S. Klinger's NEW ANNOTATED STRANGE CASE OF DR. JEKYLL AND MR. HYDE (Mysterious Press) will be published on October15.



Lisa Morton's novella HALLOWEEN BEYOND—THE TALKING-BOARD is one of three novellas contained in the anthology HALLOWEEN BEYOND: PIERCING THE VEIL, to be published October 21 by Crystal Lake Publishing. It's about a missing girl, her grieving sister, and a mysterious older woman who may hold the key.

Lee Goldberg has signed a new, two-book contract with Thomas & Mercer/Amazon Publishing that includes the fifth novel in his Eve Ronin series about a young Sheriff's department homicide detective. This comes only a few weeks after he signed a deal with Severn House to publish his thriller CALICO, which will be released in late 2023.

NBC put Matt Witten's novel 51% into development for a drama series. Matt is cowriting with showrunner Charlie Craig, under the aegis of Madison Wells. Matt and Charlie are slated to executive produce.

Ellen Byron signed a 3-book deal with Kensington Publishing for a new series, The Golden Motel Mysteries. Burned-out TV writer Dee Stern quits her job on the Kidz Channel sitcom "DUH!" and buys a rustic motel in a small California Gold Rush town at the foot of a national park. Dee soon finds herself totally out of her element as both a motelier and an amateur sleuth when a dead body pops up straddling her property and the national park.








The Milds' stories: In "Death Undisclosed" a hit-and-run accident threatens to destroy the driver in a web of guilt and passion. In "Ha'ilama and the Fevered Diva," a Hawaiian Menehune, who is a glorious singer, meets up with discordant human ambition.



Shannon Baker announces the launch of the sixth in the Kate Fox Mystery Series, EXIT WOUNDS. When Kate's mother is accused of murder, it leads to the revelation of decades-old secrets that could blow the family to pieces. Baker's been heard saying it might be her favorite Kate Fox book yet.



In Gay Toltl Kinman's latest story, "Death of a Birder," a not-so-likeable member of a dedicated birding group is found dead. Murdered by someone in the group from her past? Or in the wrong place at the wrong time? The cover, designed by Peggie Chan, is of a red-winged blackbird.

James Thorpe has just had his short story, entitled "THE REGULAR," accepted for the upcoming anthology, "CRIME UNDER THE SUN," by Partners In Crime, the San Diego Chapter of Sisters In Crime. Judges included Matt Coyle, Naomi Hirahara, and Tammy Kaehler. Anthology signing party will take place at Bouchercon 2023 in San Diego.




APPEARANCES & EVENTS
