**Connie di Marco's** second book in the Zodiac Mysteries, ALL SIGNS POINT TO MURDER, will be released on December 1 by Suspense.


MIMI LEE READS BETWEEN THE LINES, the second book in **Jennifer J. Chow's** Sassy Cat Mystery series, releases on November 10.


















The Winter Issue of *Mystery Scene*, #166 due in mid-November, features **Pat H. Broeske's** survey of James M. Cain's rough and tumble relationship with Hollywood. "Like many leading writers of the 1930s, Cain was lured to Tinseltown by the paychecks," says Broeske. Her article charts the convergence of Hollywood and Cain—from forgettable entries (including a romantic comedy about opera!) to the one-two-three punch of screen adaptations of DOUBLE INDEMNITY, MILDRED PIERCE and THE POSTMAN ALWAYS RINGS TWICE. The author liked to badmouth Hollywood—but, notes Broeske, it was a love-hate relationship that enshrined his legend.

The fourth installment in **Thomas Perry's** 39-year Butcher's Boy series, entitled EDDIE'S BOY, will be published on December 1 by Mysterious Press/Grove Atlantic.
