### The EDITOR'S CORNER

After a productive summer, I find myself in a creative rut. Mostly, I'm overwhelmed by world and local events, coupled with continued COVID concerns—you know, pretty much what everyone else is overwhelmed by. And, as we all know, things could be far worse.

I try to be upbeat in this column because that's how I try to live my life. Which doesn't mean denying my feelings or pretending things are A-okay when they're not. But it does mean that I'm proactive when it comes to my mental health and a big part of that is being goal-driven and approaching life with gratitude.

How does this help in my writing life? In a couple of ways, actually. First, I'm routine-oriented, so I stick closely to my daily To-Do list. I don't always get everything done but I get a lot closer to accomplishing my goals when I've got them written down in front of me.

It takes me about thirty days to write a short story without feeling rushed. About a month before my deadline, that story is integrated into my To-Do list, with daily required word counts, time for outlining and research, etc. I haven't quite honed my timeline for novels yet but I'm working on it.

Second, my creativity is enhanced when I feel good about myself, so two things (beyond work and other essential duties) top my daily To-Do list: exercise and therapy. I consider both of these luxury items but to be honest, if I don't do them, living in my head becomes increasingly difficult.

Recently, I watched a series of YouTube videos on story structure, specifically, about the choices our characters make after a story's inciting incident. Basically, it's human nature to avoid pain whenever we can, and where pain can't be avoided, we choose the least painful path. While this was a discussion about writing, I find it applies to real life as well. For example, exercise is painful for me—I don't like getting up early to fit it into my schedule and it's tiring while I do it. But I've learned that *not* doing it is even more painful. And so, I exercise. Therapy is much the same.

I'll admit, the work I do to keep myself on an even keel is sometimes exhausting. It's tempting to simply live life without giving too much thought to it. But this isn't how I'm made—I require more effort. And maybe it's not how you're made, either. That's why I tell you this stuff.






**Andrew Kaplan's** new book, BLUE MADAGASCAR, has won the 2021 Global eBook Award for Best Thriller Novel of the Year.

IN TWILIGHT'S HUSH by **Laurie Stevens** is a finalist for Killer Nashville's Silver Falchion Award for "Best Investigator."













#### ADVICE FOR TV WRITERS: WRITE THE LYRICS

Some years ago, I received a piece of valuable professional advice that I feel has not been sufficiently shared with my fellow WGA and MWA members.

I was lunching with a pair of young freelancers whose names, I'm sorry to say, I've forgotten. Veterans compared to my at-the-time "just breaking in" status, I was eagerly picking their brains for tips on pitching, relating to staffers, etc. As we were finishing and about to leave the deli, they volunteered an afterthought that turned out for me to be a gem: "Listen, Tom, another thing, when you get a drama episode to write—you know, like a detective series—whenever your protagonist drives his car, or goes into, like, a nightclub, write song lyrics that can be coming from the stage, or his car radio. The producers'll have 'em set to music, you join ASCAP (American Society of Composers, Authors & Publishers), and you'll collect royalties on top of your residuals."

I nodded, thanked them, we went our ways—and I promptly forgot about that suggestion. For about two years.

It was almost dinnertime when my phone rang. It was Producer Bob van Scoyk, calling from Universal. I had just submitted the first draft of my first teleplay for a new, not-yet-on-the-air mystery series. The episode was titled "Broadway Malady." It was about characters involved in a big new Broadway musical in rehearsal, and at several points in my stage directions I indicated that players were to be rehearsing in the background. My initial thought was that there was a problem with my script. But Bob quickly allayed that: "No, Tom. We love it. I just have one question. Where you say they're rehearsing, do you want us to write the lyrics, or do you—?" I cut him off as the memory of that advice came pouring back; "I'll do it, Bob. Thanks."

About fifteen minutes later, it was done. I'd knocked out a pastiche of Broadway Show Lyrics: "I can open doors for myself now, thankyouverymuch," and like that. I sent them off, joined ASCAP. I've collected tens of thousand of dollars in royalties over nearly four decades. I recently received a check for \$140.

Obviously there's a lot of luck involved. For starters, the new series was *Murder She Wrote*. And, immersed as I was in the challenges of the still new-to-me mystery genre, and the privilege of writing for *the* Angela Lansbury, that old advice had not entered my consciousness. Plus, you aren't always going to be writing for a show with the afterlife of MSW. But hey—network!

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**Tom Sawyer** is an Edgar & Emmy-nominated screenwriter, novelist, playwright, and Head Writer and Showrunner of *Murder, She Wrote*, for which he wrote twenty-four episodes. He's sold and written nine network series pilots. He wrote and directed the feature-film comedy, *Alice Goodbody* and is the co-librettist/lyricist of *Jack*, a musical-drama about JFK which has been performed to acclaim in US & Europe. He authored bestselling mystery/thrillers THE SIXTEENTH MAN and NO PLACE TO RUN. His latest novel is A MAJOR PRODUCTION!, second in the Barney Moon, PI series. His memoir is THE ADVENTURES OF THE REAL TOM SAWYER and he co-authored its companion book: 9 BADADSS SECRETS FOR PUTTING YOURSELF IN LUCK'S WAY. More at thomasbsawyer.com.
