This morning, I was on YouTube, looking for an <u>ambiance video</u> to play in the background while I drank my coffee and read the news. During my search, I happened upon an unrelated video about <u>bullet</u> journaling for writers.

I'm an absolute sucker for this sort of thing. I *love* planners and notebooks. Not only do they provide a creative outlet for me, they provide inspiration and help me define my goals. There's nothing like a <u>beautifully designed planner layout</u> to get me going.

I watched the video, and I ended up being both inspired and overwhelmed. Inspired because the idea of creating one of these for myself sounded fun. Overwhelmed because I realized the writer who'd designed it was working on three different projects at the same time one in the editing phase, one in the writing phase, and one in the plotting stage.

I found myself thinking about whether adding more projects to my plate—all at different stages of development—might be helpful to my overall productivity and output.

The answer to that question is *yes*. If I'm working more, I'm producing more. But does that mean I'd *finish* more? Knowing myself as I do, I understand that adding more projects would probably mean I'd abandon the WIP I've been working on in favor of something shiny and new.

I dream of being a writer who is able to focus on multiple projects. For a long time, I beat myself up about it. Thankfully, I've moved past the negative self-talk, and it's helped me put things in perspective. I truly believe that knowing and trusting our own processes, plus working within the natural boundaries our minds create for us, is one of the keys to living a satisfying creative life.

All this to say, I won't be designing a writer's bullet journal or adding any more books to my plate any time soon.




OVER THE TRANSOM

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


