The General Awards chair for the MWA Edgar Awards is looking for Active Status members to serve as judges for the 2024 Edgar Awards.

If you're interested in judging for the Edgar Awards, please let us know. Keep in mind that you must be a current Active Status member. Many books (that you get to keep, if you wish) are sent by publishers via UPS, Fedex and the like, so you must also have a UPS-friendly shipping address (no post office boxes). You also have the option of receiving digital files.

**Please note:** There is no guarantee of being selected. In balancing the makeup of their committees, the awards category chairs must consider many factors when inviting judges.

Depending on the category, judging can be a lot of work. The current award categories include:

Last month, I attended a skeptics conference in Las Vegas with my husband, who was one of the speakers. It's a weekend full of talks promoting science, rational thought, debunking conspiracy theories, et cetera.

One of the highlights was an interview with Penn Jillette and Teller.

During the Q & A, an audience member asked Penn how he gets so much done. Along with his near-nightly performances at the Rio Hotel & Casino, he does TV, writes novels, and a number of other projects.

It turns out, Penn uses the <u>Pomodoro Technique</u>—a version of it, at least. He sets a timer for 30-45 minutes and gets to work several times a day.

I've been a proponent of the Pomodoro Technique for many years now. And if it's good enough for Penn, I'd say I'm on the right track.



## **OVER THE TRANSOM**






Cry Wolf, a new book by Linda O. Johnston (writing as Lark O. Jensen), will be published by Crooked Lane Books on November 7.


