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PRESIDENT'S RAP SHEET

Family is Everything BY LESLIE S. KLINGER



The Thanksgiving holiday weekend was a quiet one for us. My wife has been dealing with health issues all summer and fall, so we skipped hosting a dinner this year. Instead, we indulged in a marathon of movies: *The Godfather*, parts one, two, and three (that's about nine hours of film). We've seen them all many times before, of course, but it's always a special treat to view them (the director's cut) all at once. I remember reading Mario Puzo's book when it appeared in 1969, but it had nowhere near the impact of the films. One of the most amazing aspects of the films, in my opinion, is that while parts one and two were made consecutively in 1972 and 1974; it took sixteen years for Coppola to release part three to complete the tragedy of Michael Corleone.

Mario Puzo received co-writing credit for all three films and had a major hand in shaping them. While, as always, some backstory of characters in his book had to be discarded, he had the opportunity in the scripts to go far beyond the scope of the original book (which ends with the Corleones relocating to Nevada) in so many respects. The films explore not only the history of twentieth-century America—attitudes about immigrants, World War Two, the Keefauver hearings, the American definition of success—but also the role of women, racial attitudes, the value of the arts, and a detailed examination of relative morality.

Puzo may well have drawn on Dostoevsky's *The Brothers Karamazov* and Balzac's *Pére Goriot*, but what writer doesn't borrow from those who came before? One might point to Shakespeare's *King Lear* and Arthur Miller's *Death of a Salesman* for similar themes. If there's a message to me inherent in watching these films at Thanksgiving, it's that—as the Corleones embody in the darkest way—family is everything.

Our families shape us, warp us, inculcate us with values, and motivate us. They provide us with the richest material to explore in our books. And while at this time of the year, we have to squeeze in writing amidst shopping, cooking, dishwashing, and the like, at least we're not shoveling snow!


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
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
OVER THE TRANSOM
