

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EDITOR'S CORNER

Writing as Medicine

Well, friends, I don't mind telling you that the past week was a lot for me. My husband and I lost our beloved dog, Stella, on October 20. Sometimes, life comes at you fast and furious and your only real goal is keeping your head above water. I barely made it.

But we returned yesterday from a much-needed getaway in Lake Tahoe, and now, I feel ready to tackle the rest of the year. It's amazing how just two days of respite in a new/different place, unplugged from devices, can have the power to re-energize a person. I'd be lying if I said I'm completely recovered, but I'm ready to face my new normal, for which I'm grateful.

I put my WIP on hold last week because I didn't have the headspace for creativity. But ironically, I ended up writing more than usual in the form of journaling. When I was at my lowest, I wrote my little heart out. I let all of my feelings pour onto the page, and I can't tell you how much it helped me process my grief.

This was a different kind of work than the fiction I normally write, and I was reminded of this quote, attributed to Red Smith, a sportswriter: "Writing is easy; you just open up a vein and bleed."

I'm not saying the writing I did this past week was particularly good. But it was real. Honest. Something amazing happens when you're stripped bare of your protective shell and you allow yourself to write your feelings with authenticity and no boundaries. If only I could figure out a way to do it when my heart isn't broken in pieces.

And I wonder how much other writers think about being emotionally authentic in their work. As crime writers, getting the facts right is important, but how much do we focus on emotions? Some authors do it exceedingly well, but I think for many of us, it's far easier to describe the clinical details of a crime scene than it is to take a deep dive into the emotional impact on the characters involved.

He has provided Crisis Negotiation training to federal and local law enforcement officers, as well as police and military personnel in foreign countries. Prior to the FBI, Leighton served as a prosecutor in Winchester, Virginia, where he was an Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney.




Murder on the Page, a new release by Daryl Wood Gerber, is the first in the Literary Dining Mystery series from Kensington Books.

A Dark September Night is the first in a new series by Patricia Smiley, author of the Tucker Sinclair novels and the Pacific Homicide series. When Emmaline McCoy's beloved aunt dies in a hit-and-run accident, she leaves her L.A. corporate job for the Northern California coastal town of Justice Bay to settle the estate. 


Ellen Byron will be on a panel titled "The Funny Thing About Murder" at the Midwest Mystery Conference in Chicago, IL on Saturday, November 9.

Remembering Bob

It's with great sadness that I note the passing of Robert Joseph Randisi, one of the stalwarts in our field. The fact that he wrote more than 650 novels and novellas and some 60 short stories earns him a place among the pantheon in the celestial Genre Hall of Fame. He wrote mysteries (in particular, check out his Miles Jacoby PI novels), westerns, horror, science-fiction, fantasy, and "men's adventure"—having done pulp duty on long-running paperback original series Nick Carter: Killmaster and Remo Williams, the Destroyer. As J. R. Roberts, a good portion of the books he wrote was the Gunsmith series, turning out one a month for years—more than 400 in total. In an interview for *Shotsmag* conducted by Ali Karim, Bob noted he usually worked on two books at a time, splitting up day and nighttime writing on them.

In 1981, Bob founded the <u>Private Eye Writers of America</u> (PWA), which awards the Shamus in several categories. With his friend, the late mystery writer Ed Gorman, he co-founded *Mystery Scene* magazine in 1985. Thirty years ago, when my first novel was published featuring private eye Ivan Monk, Bob invited me to contribute to more than one of the anthologies he edited back then, as well as others over time. At some point, he talked me into being the president of the PWA, though I know that was merely a figurehead gig. SoCalMWA's board member, **Gay Toltl Kinman**, is the current president.

Years later, he and I would co-edit the anthology 44 Caliber Funk: Tales of Crime, Soul and Payback. It was our love letter to the halcyon '70s. The collection includes stories by March of Crime editor Holly West, our past chapter presidents Travis Richardson and the late Robert Levinson, as well as one by Shamus award winner John Shepphird. As also noted in the Shotsmag interview, one of Bob's Rat Pack mysteries, Everybody Kills Somebody Sometime, was optioned by Sandy Hackett, son of comedian Buddy Hackett. Bob, of course, wrote the screenplay adapting his book.

In 2016, Bob received the Peacemaker Life Achievement award from the Western Fictioneers. That same year, he also received the John Sigenthaler Legends Award at Killer Nashville. In 2017, he was presented with the Derringer Award for Life Achievement by the Short Fiction Mystery Society.

You will be missed, Bob!
