Still, I firmly believe that the moral arc of the universe tends toward justice and mercy and goodness, and when those bad things happen, we can bend that arc in that direction. Our books—believe this!—can teach our readers how.

My heart goes out to so many friends who lost their homes. This includes several of our Chapter members. I'm proud that the immediate impulse of our Board and members was to say, "How can we help?" The National Board expressed much the same.

"A Deadline" is about a teen with a summer job giving away free lunches who overhears life and death, while "What's Really Unforgettable" is about an immigrant entrepreneur who loses his memory just before he is about to cash in and take his company public.

Susan Cummins Miller's latest novel, *My Bonney Lies Under*, a Keridec Rees historical mystery set in the summer of 1885, was released in January by Artemesia Publishing. Also, Miller's latest poetry collection, *Deciphering the Desert*, received the 2024 Will Rogers Silver Medallion Award in Western Written Poetry.

Rosemary Lord is the author of nonfiction history books *Los Angeles Then and Now* and *Hollywood Then and Now*, which have been bought by Harper Collins Publishers.
